Dear Colleagues and Professors,

We welcome you back to the 2019 Fall Semester at UC Merced. We would like to take this opportunity to inform you of several developments that have taken place over the past months regarding the issue of foreign influence. The federal government's scrutiny of foreign influence on academic research centers remains intense, and over the summer the UC has taken action on specific interactions with the restricted entity Huawei.

In July of 2019, the University of California placed an <u>indefinite moratorium</u> on any interactions with Huawei and its U.S. affiliate Huawei Devices USA. This means no UC location may undertake any new engagements with Huawei or its affiliates until further notice. Prohibited engagements include purchasing equipment or devices, receiving research grants or contracts, accepting gifts, entering into MOUs, memberships or consortium agreements, technology transfers or licensing of UC IP, or exchanging any technical information with Huawei.

We also would like to remind researchers of their obligations to disclose to federal sponsors all foreign activities. This includes any foreign support, research sites, components, and affiliations, both paid and unpaid, and honorary affiliations of the sort that are often listed on a PI biosketches. It is extremely important that researchers strive for utmost transparency when disclosing their international research activities to federal funding agencies.

It is now required that UC personnel must follow a formal <u>Escalation Protocol</u> when federal funding agencies formally inquire about foreign activities that are taking place on UC campuses.
